## ኝ Interbranch Luncheon

On Feb. 5th, six Paradise branch members joined about 30 other women from the Interbranch Council chapters for the annual IBC luncheon, held this year in Yuba City. Our featured speaker was Robin Pleau, a PhD student in Sociology at UC Davis and recipient of an AAUW Funds Fellowship award to further her research. Ms. Pleau described her research on multi-generational households. She has found that the number of such households has increased by millions over the last twenty years. In future, Ms. Pleau wants to work for a non-profit and explore how multi-generational households effect women's employment.

Yuba City reported that several hundred girls attended their career day event, which is held on a school day and is preceded the day before by a similar event for boys.

Carol Holzgrafe of Chico & Paradise reported on Tech Trek developments, including a new camp at UC Davis (where our scholars will go this summer) and a probable scholarship cost increase of \$50 to meet ever-rising costs.

Jana Lawton from Chico said a committee is forming to implement the one-member, one-vote rule, and she asked for volunteers.

## Public Policy for March

This just in from AAUW headquarters: Only weeks into the 112th Congress, conservative lawmakers are already working to weaken public education by diverting public funds from public education and into private and religious schools. Sen. Joseph Lieberman (I-CT) has introduced a bill that would reauthorize and expand the failed D.C. school vouchers program which Congress had agreed to end last year. AAUW stands firmly by the belief that the country should provide an excellent education for all children, not private school vouchers for a few.

While the House bill to redefine what constitutes rape to further limit abortion availability was defeated in the House after a huge public outcry, the new Congress is paying special attention to a woman's right to choose. Most recently, the House voted to de-fund Planned Parenthood by passing a bill that prohibits the government "from providing any federal family planning assistance to an entity ... that performs an abortion." This would also prohibit Planned Parenthood from receiving federal funds to provide cancer screenings, birth control, and testing and treatment for sexually transmitted infections, because it also provides abortions.

Not an AAUW-studied bill, but members should be aware that the just-released Republican budget provides \$0.00 (zero/nada/nothing) for NPR and PBS, the public broadcasting systems that bring you, your children and grandchildren Sesame Street, Nova and Nature, Ken Burn's Baseball, The Civil War, The National Parks, Masterpiece Theatre, Mystery and Antiques Roadshow. Local PBS stations (KCHO/KIXE etc.) bring you California Gold and other north state shows.

While KQED in San Francisco receives only 7.8% of its budget from the feds, our local KIXE gets 45% of its budget from the government. It won't survive this cut and we will be left with programming from Fox News and mainstream shows—with all that really icky advertising.

If life without Sesame Street, All Things Considered, Nova and The News Hour (just rated the most trusted news source in the U.S.) is unacceptable, start writing.

Our Congressman, Wally Herger, has voted in favor of \$0 funds for PBS and for redefining of rape. If this matters to you, call and write. You can make a difference.! *Carol Holzgrafe*, Public Policy Chair

# ኝ Other Public Policy Issues

## Challenges to Reproductive Freedom

AAUW has long supported women's rights for social justice, and since 1977 has made reproductive rights a public policy principle. The AAUW 2009-2011 Public Policy Program advocates "choice in the determination of one's reproductive life". AAUW trusts that every woman has the ability to make her informed choices regarding her reproductive life within the dictates of her own moral and religious beliefs. Further, AAUW believes that these deeply personal decisions should be made without government interference.

The U.S. Supreme Court's 1973 ruling in Roe v. Wade legalized abortion for all women and found it to be a constitutionally protected " fundamental right". However, many of the most vulnerable groups of American women are being denied control over their reproductive lives due to increasing restrictions brought about legislatively.

Within the past month, Rep. Chris Smith (R-N.J.) introduced H.R.3, which would prohibit the use of federal funds to buy any health insurance that includes abortion coverage, even if those services are paid for with private money. Among its several restrictive provisions, it would ban the use of flex spending on health savings accounts to pay for abortion, and ban employers and the self- insured from using tax breaks to buy private health insurance that covers abortion. AAUW opposes this legislation.

#### AAUW Public Policy: Proposed Changes

At both the national and state levels, AAUW reviews and revises its Public Policy Principles and Priorities every two years. Some of the national changes are:

- Advocating public education free of harassment <u>and bullying.</u>
- Explicitly adding a position against human trafficking.
- Opposition to the use of public funds for nonpublic elementary and secondary education and to charter schools <u>that do</u> <u>not adhere to the same civil rights and</u> <u>accountability standards as other public</u> <u>schools.</u>

Replacing "vocational" with " career and technical" in strengthening educational programs.
