Meet Charter Member Dianne Lorenz

35 YEARS: AAUW Paradise 1980-2015

"It is a truth universally acknowledged"* that the more we think we know someone, the more we discover we don't. Paradise Charter Member Dianne Lorenz is such a person.

When Marygrace Colby and I visited Dianne in January, I knew she had lived in Paradise for many decades. What I didn't know is how she got here. I didn't know Dianne had lived in Germany for a few years, that she was from a Very Interesting Family, or how she and her husband Alex ended up in Paradise running a successful business. Now I do.

The saga begins this way: Dianne was born into a large, French Catholic pioneering family, the LeGrands, who settled and farmed a good part of Colusa County. Her father was one of nine children, Dianne, one of six; the family took up 50 percent of the pews in church. One of Dianne's treasures is a book of stories and pictures of 100 years of LeGrand history.

Dianne said the family was able to acquire more land because they had plenty of farm workers (the children) of which lending banks approved. As a result, she may be one of few AAUW members who can milk a cow.

"I had a Lake Woebegon-West upbringing", Dianne said. "We could play outdoors with a sense of safety and security."

This bucolic life changed when, following family tradition, Dianne enrolled at San Francisco State. However, she had to room with her older sister in Mary Ward Hall. "Doesn't that sound like a prison?"

So she transferred to CSUC at the end of her first semester, and there she met Alex. They married the summer of junior year.

Alex, who had majored in engineering, began work as an engineering technician. They bought a modest fixer-upper in Saratoga. "Picture me, 9 months pregnant and rolling paint on the ceiling," she said.

Dianne finished her B.A. degree in English at San Jose State and produced two children. "I felt like I was pregnant the whole time we lived there," she said. During one semester break she took a week off to have Monica; Mark was born a year later during Easter break.

"Then I went home to be a housewife," Dianne said. "I didn't have a career goal as an English major and was brought up in culture where women were the helpmates." Teaching didn't appeal and, besides, back then a family could live on one salary.

In 1969 the family moved to Germany, near Munich where Alex was offered a job. He had been born there and spoke German like a native. Dianne did not. The family did have adventures traveling through most of Western Europe in a VW camper.

After three years Dianne wanted to come home. Alex transferred to Raychem in Menlo Park. A year later, in 1973, Marika was born, completing the family.

Though Dianne enjoyed being a wife and mother, she got a bit bored with staying home. She had volunteered for the Palo Alto Women's Resource Center counseling women on career choices and how to combine family and career.

During a reduction at Raychem Alex took a buyout and they moved to Paradise with 9 months' salary, a house but no job. "We thought something would work out," she said.

"Alex was always entrepreneurial," Dianne said, though she hadn't known that before.

Dianne did the billing and paperwork for Alex Lorenz Foreign Car Repair, their first business. While ordering rubber stamps from Corbell's Printing she discovered that the Corbells wanted to retire so, when Alex said, "Oh, that's something Dianne could do," and she didn't say no, they bought the inventory and equipment and set up at home. Now, with A and D Lorenz Rubber Stamp, they had two businesses.

When the computer era arrived Alex discovered sign engraving, gave up car repair, and went into graphics, then printing. The business expanded with as many as 11 employees in the heyday before everyone had computers and thought they could do their own printing. The older children always helped out too. This, of course, was Graphics Impressions, where they stayed for 30 years.

"Alex grew the business but couldn't have done it without my support," Dianne said.

The three children are now grown and have successful lives, happily producing grandchildren. Monica lives in Paradise with her three and works for United Health Care.

Mark lives in Orange County and is part owner and manager of a courier company. "He now understands the challenges of a small business," Dianne said. Mark has one son.

Marika is at Beale Air Force Base in the Intelligence Division. She is married and lives with her husband and daughter Anika, age 7, near Beale.

Hobbies and Interests

Sailing, of course. They started with a car topper boat, then moved up to a 36-foot Catalina that sleeps 5 and is berthed in Richmond.

"Alex is a natural, "Dianne said. "I'm not but I enjoy it."

"I like reading poetry," she said. Mary Oliver and Billy Collins who re-introduced her to poetry. "I didn't know poetry was like that!" She also loves to walk and garden.

On traveling Dianne says, "I'm not the adventurer in the family; Alex is. I don't need to see the Taj Mahal."

Why did she join AAUW? Moving to Paradise in 1976 she asked herself, "Where am I going to meet like-minded women? I saw an announcement in the paper for an AAUW membership tea for the Chico branch. "The minute I walked in the door I knew I had found my connection."

She enjoyed the Chico branch. However, so many women from the Ridge were tired of making the drive and wanted to start a branch in Paradise. At first Dianne was not too involved, the business and family being all-consuming. But that was to change.

In the 80s Dianne began to work on a masters degree in career counseling. "I loved that period," she said. Soon she was teaching career classes in Paradise, Gridley, and Ridgeview high schools, and résumé development with Dept. of Rehabilitation clients.

"How could I have thought I didn't want to be a teacher?" she wondered.

AAUW involvement and memories

Positions held in the branch(s): president, 1988-89, copresident/facilitator with Lynn Eads 2011-13, secretary 2000-10, membership 2000-01. A founding member of the couples evening book group, member of Gourmet (Paradise and Chico), newsletter 1997-98, chaired Women's History Month. She was EF Honoree 1986-87 and 2000-01, received the President's Award 1985-86 and '97-'98 and is still Interest Group Coordinator.

How do you want people to remember you?

"Mainly being a kind and compassionate person and being a good listener," Dianne said.

So, after 35 years, Dianne Lorenz is still a happy member of Paradise AAUW. She is always smiling — and we smile whenever she comes in the door.

History Brought to Life

Our Paradise AAUW branch will celebrate Women's History Month by bringing an important part of California's history to life for 4th grade classes in Paradise and Magalia. Branch members will appear in costume, taking on the roles of Mrs. John Bidwell, Dr. Ella Gatchell, and Mrs. Louise Clappe the last week of March.

Member Linda Fletcher Brannam will assume the role of Annie Bidwell, wife of Chico's founder, and will tell about her life in early day Chico and about the causes that she supported. Lani McManus will play the role of Dr. Ella Gatchell, first female doctor north of Sacramento and cousin of John Bidwell. She will share information about diseases and remedies of the times and discuss her medical training in a day when few women were doctors. Nancy Wirtz-Lunde will talk about life in the mining camp of RichBar where Louise Clappe lived with her husband during the gold rush period of California's history. Students will also learn some of the songs miners sang during that time.

This is the 10th year that Paradise Branch of AAUW has brought these presentations to Ridge classrooms. Fourth graders study California History and the presentations are geared to complement classroom studies.
