■The View From Here



The CASA Presentation on October 17th was an eye opener. More than 88 children enter foster care every day in California. The Court Appointed Special

Advocates (CASA) are doing wonderful things to improve these children's lives.

Ronda Hoffman (AAUW member) also a CASA volunteer, was our host for this evening's presentation. The presenters were Lisa Michaels, Butte-Glenn CASA Program Supervisor, Tracy Hunsicker and Chris Hoffman, CASA volunteers.

They gave us examples of why children are removed from their homes and what happens when Child Protective Services removes a child from their home.

They shared stories about these children's path through foster care program. They explained the role of a CASA volunteer, and emphasized the significant importance of CASA volunteers advocating for these children. Each volunteer must attend training so they can become certified to represent 'their' child in court when necessary, etc.

What can you do to Help? Donate money, attend their fundraisers, be a fundraiser committee member and/or of course, become a trained CASA Advocate.

Why AAUW Why AAUW Funds



Over \$100,000,000 to 12,000 women and projects in 135 years, that's why.

Bulletin! AAUW exists for more than books, bridge and dining out and even more than Tech Trek and local scholarships.

Those are the fun bits offered so members will work together for "a larger good". And, what are those, you may ask. Well.....

AAUW was established in 1881 (this is your history lesson for today) for the purpose of providing fellowships and grants to graduate women. There were none in the United States at the time. Startling but true. So, a small group of women raised funds and found capable and ambitious women to receive the grants, allowing them to continue their education. Over the past 135 years this has been AAUW's fundamental reason for being.

Of course, we have "expanded our horizons" and, based on our vision statement, "AAUW empowers all women and girls to reach their highest potential," we work hard to affect legislative activity in both Washington, D.C. and in state capitols. We are, I always say, the good lobbyists.

Some details before I get to the good part: this year \$3.7 million has been awarded by AAUW to 250 fellowship and grant recipients in the U.S., with 26 of them studying or directing projects in California. Our members in California contributed \$1,958,609.27. By the way, AAUW now encourages us to donate, not to individual funds, but to an unrestricted fund so they can distribute the proceeds where they are needed the most

•• Once a year AAUW members get a chance, at a lunch, to meet a few of these stellar recipients and hear about their work. I try NEVER to miss this.

Imagine a room full of (mostly women of a certain age) listening to young women describe their Ph.D. work, why they chose that subject and what travails they endured to get there. Imagine grins, smiles, applause and even cheers. We look at each other and say, silently, THIS is why we joined AAUW.

I attended one of two lunches in the Bay Area on Oct. 28. These are the fabulous young women who spoke:

Alissa Walter is from Georgetown University. She has been researching at Stanford for two years (thanks to her AAUW fellowship) to find why Iraq fell apart in extreme factions when invaded in 2003 instead of joining together to repel the invader. The answer is the way Saddam Hussein ran his government and the country. Fascinating!! All 10 million documents from that regime are at Stanford.

Zesemayat Mekonnen at both U.C. San Francisco and Berkeley. She studies the effects of environmental factors on fetal health and will receive both her Ph.D. and an M.D. when the project is complete.

Adele Kuzmiakova from Slovakia is a computational engineer and studying smart cities: the effects of cars and buildings, energy use etc. on weather and other factors.

Chyndyli Rogel, from the Philippines, is at the Monterey Institute of International Studies (now called Middleburg). She referred to AAUW members as "Leaders who are driven to achieve social change." A higher compliment I can't imagine.

Our Paradise contributions to the Educational Funds/AAUW Funds effort – now called Educational Opportunities - are due Dec. 1. You may be hearing how you can contribute to this truly valuable idea. An AAUW fellowship or grant truly changes the lives of young women and their families. This is who we are!
