Public Policy

When Women Vote ...
They Change the Conversation!

AAUW California supports the passage of Propositions 1 and 28 on the November ballot in California.

Proposition 1. The decision by the Supreme Court of the United States to overturn Roe v. Wade dealt a serious blow to the rights of women to make their own decision about their bodies. This spurred many state legislatures to act to ban abortion, some with no exceptions for rape, incest, or endangering the life of the mother. Abortion bans in other states have already taken effect. Yet polls in many states show a majority in support of protecting the rights of women to choose to have abortions. Currently women are coming from other states to obtain abortions in California. An Abortion Access website is being formed in our state to enable and assist out-of-state women with travel arrangements, housing, medical appointments and other matters.

California Legislators, recognizing the remote possibility that at some future time state legislation could ban abortions, took timely action in June to pass SCR 10. This put Proposition 1, the Constitutional Right to Reproductive Freedom, on the November ballot. Passage of Prop 1 will amend the California Constitution, stating "Section 1.1 is added to Article I thereof, to read: SEC. 1.1. The state shall not deny or interfere with an individual's reproductive freedom in their most intimate decisions, which includes their fundamental right to choose to have an abortion and their fundamental right to choose or refuse contraceptives. This section is intended to further the constitutional right to privacy guaranteed by Section 1, and the constitutional right to not be denied equal

protection guaranteed by Section 7. Nothing herein narrows or limits the right to privacy or equal protection."

AAUW CA has begun a Social Media campaign to educate and encourage voters to support Prop 1. Weekly messages contain important facts. If you don't use social media, we urge you to email the messages to others who do!

Proposition 28. In the context of AAUW CA's Public Policy Priorities in support of Education, AAUW CA supports Proposition 28, The Arts and Music in Schools - Funding Guarantee and Accountability Act. Studies on educational achievement prove that arts and music education improve student learning. Music education has been shown to improve cognitive development and spatial reasoning while the dramatic arts improve reading comprehension. Arts and music education has also been shown to improve school attendance and individual self-confidence and motivation to learn, particularly among poor and other at-risk students. Yet these programs are usually the first cut when school budgets are reduced. Prop 28 would provide a minimum source of annual funding coming from the state General Fund to K-12 public schools to supplement arts education programs. School districts would be held accountable to use the funds for hiring certificated employees and purchasing supplies and materials. Tech Trek

We did it! The residential Tech Trek camp at U.C. Davis returned after a long two-year hiatus. We only had one 7th grade girl apply to the Davis camp: Payton Arkenberg of Paradise Charter Middle School. She came highly recommended by Mr. Palmer, one of our always-reliable nominating teachers.

Our selection committee determined that Payton would be the perfect camper and so she turned out to be. She loved the camp and it loved her back. (I heard from camp staff).

From a thank you note Payton wrote near the end of camp:

Dear AAUW: Thank you for sponsoring me so I can come to this camp. I really enjoyed learning about cameras and video editing in my morning core class, Media Arts. I enjoyed all of the STEM experiences like field trips* and electives. This STEM camp really showed me how amazing it can be."

*The field trips were to the School of Veterinary Medicine, the Bohart Museum of Entomology, the Graduate School of Chemistry where the girls did experiments with the students, and the Mondavi Center for Performing Arts (the physics of lighting, sound, and colors).

One camper mother wrote recently that, when her daughter returned home, she said that Tech Trek was the most fun she had ever had. "Then she went to sleep for the rest of the day." (Not unusual. Camp is tiring but oh, so invigorating.)

Now, it's on to earning funds to send another girl or two from a Paradise school to next year's camp. As you all know, being exposed to other girls who love STEM too, meeting women working in the fields, and living on a college campus can be invaluable to a young girl's future choices. Especially in our little town where not every family has a college tradition. We do good work, worth supporting.
